Volunteers vital to award-winning Lifetime Networks

The Saanich-based Lifetime Networks is the Greater Victoria Chamber of Commerce 2017 Non-Profit of the Year.

"It's very, very exciting," Lifetime Networks executive director Wendy-Sue Andrew says of the Chamber award, sponsored by Children's Health Foundation of Vancouver Island.

Lifetime Networks is a not-for-

profit organization that builds networks of friends, provides continuing education, community engagement support, employment preparation, job search, 'on the job' support and more for people with disabilities from inclusive, safe, welcoming settings.

Because so much of the organization's efforts relies on community support, the award will raise awareness for both fundraising efforts and the volunteers, Andrew said.

Last year, Lifetime Networks recorded more than 6.000 volunteer hours ranging from fundraising events to the Best Buddies program that pairs UVic students with individuals with developmental disabilities, Andrew said, adding they're always looking for more people to help out.

Since its founding in 1998, Lifetime Networks has expanded beyond establishing personal support networks to the addition of a wide range of offerings, including fine arts programs, Best Buddies, continuing education and employment support services.

Throughout this growth, however,

Lifetime Networks' goal remains the same: increase the number of relationships in the lives of people with disabilities.

Runner-up in the Greater Victoria Chamber of Commerce awards was Our Place Society, whose services include 45-room transitional housing, a dining room and nutrition bar serving more than 1,200 free, nutritious weekday meals and a drop-in centre offering numerous programs and a place of welcome.


